


Peter Sanders Memorial

In 2022 I will aim to run every day for a year!



After the birth of my son, running became my way of coping with the overwhelming sensation of being a new parent. It offered me a chance to get out, be active and reset my head. Sometimes it would give me a chance to think about things and sometimes I wouldn't think about anything at all, just run.

Perinatal depression (during pregnancy and the first year of being a parent) affects 1 in 10 new parents, mums and dads alike. It can be totally debilitating and leave you feeling like you are suffering alone.

However, wonderful charities and foundations like Pandas UK offer support, guidance and care to those who need it most.



I was lucky; I found my way of coping, alongside amazingly supportive friends and family. Not everyone is fortunate enough to be in this position.

By taking on this challenge, I hope to raise awareness and vital funds for this amazing cause. It may be 1km or 10km, but the main thing will be that I am out there every day.



If anyone fancies joining me for a run, in person or virtually, then I would welcome the support.

To date, Hollie has raised almost £1,500 but would like to reach her target of £2000.

From the Vicar



Earlier this year there was a meeting in the Church to discuss the future of music at St. Lawrence.

The context was that a combination of circumstances – not least Covid – had put under threat something which most people thought was of very great value indeed: the musical tradition of choir and organist, leading our community in singing together, and performing a wide range of the classic music from the Church's great tradition. There was a clear sense that we wanted that tradition to flourish – and what we'll have to think about now is what that will cost. (The answer, unsurprisingly, involves money – more of which another time).

Not all Christians have been convinced we should bother. In his *Confessions*, written in the fourth century, St.

Augustine writes about how he finds music in church deeply troubling: it is so beautiful, he fears, that it will distract his mind from God. Maybe people will come for the music, and not for God – and perhaps that temptation should be removed. According to the historian Diarmaid MacCulloch, the sixteenth century Protestant Reformers shared Augustine's anxiety:

'Reformed churches frowned on the Catholic or Lutheran frivolity of singing

non-biblical texts in Church, and their singing was confined to the psalms of David in metrical form. In most Reformed territories, they also insisted that this singing be done without the benefit of the pipe-organ, which they regarded as part of past superstition and generally destroyed: this was just as much the case in English parish churches, where nationwide from around 1570 organs were nearly all removed or terminally neglected. Only in the Netherlands did Reformed parish churches continue to boast increasingly elaborate and splendid organs, and that is an illustration of the peculiar balance between church and civil authority there.

Ministers might disapprove, but the urban Regents liked the splendid sound, and insisted on maintaining organs for recitals for public enjoyment, even if the festively decorated organs were not used in worship. They were deliberately overriding the clergy's objections to show who was boss.'

Now there is a striking phrase: to show who was boss. Issues of power and control are indeed close to the heart of the sometimes tempestuous relations between clergy and musicians. At a superficial level this is obviously true: even when the two get on, their different vocations tend to bring with them at least differing emphases in approach to public worship. But perhaps it is true at a more fundamental level too. Clergy, you see, are very keen on words. Preaching and teaching is what we do, because (for us) the most important thing is that people hear and understand God's Word. Putting it crudely, for clergy sometimes it seems like the readings from Scripture and the sermon are the essential

business, whilst what the choir does is wrapping paper. Beautiful wrapping perhaps, but wrapping nonetheless. Indeed, perhaps the music is even dangerous – people might prefer it over our sermons! Perhaps they will find beauty and meaning in it which hasn't come from us, and which is out of our control.

To which concerns the best answer is: thanks be to God. Thanks be, that there is something more in our worship than words and doctrines and ideas. Thanks be, that in music we have been given a powerful gift: something which has the power to penetrate body and soul so radically, which can move us most at our depths. 'He spoke with authority, and not as one of their scribes', the Gospel says at one point of Jesus. Well, Music often speaks with something like that authority, whilst preachers so frequently do not – the music reaches into the hearer's heart and wakes the knowledge of God within. It shares the mystery of which it speaks, and gives it to the listener.

Someone who knew this was Karl Barth, the great 20th century Reformed theologian – and never one, incidentally, to underestimate the importance of preaching. Every day, after silent prayer - he might say, I think, as part of prayer he would sit and listen to Mozart. And in his great *Church Dogmatics* he wrote this: '...(Mozart) has created a music for which 'beautiful' is not a fitting epithet: music which for the Christian is not mere entertainment, enjoyment or edification, but food and drink: music full of comfort and counsel for his needs; music which is never a slave to its technique nor sentimental, but always 'moving', free and liberating because

wise, strong and sovereign.' God's Word, it seems, isn't restricted to using words: the Word which was made flesh speaks through music, and shares itself with our whole being.

There seems something paradoxical about using a lot of words to say how God is not restricted to words, so I bring this article to an end. All that is left to say is: we have had a superb tradition of music at St. Lawrence, which has fed so many people's spiritual hungers as mere words could never have done. Thank you to everyone who has made that possible, to musicians and singers and to those who have footed the bill and given all kinds of practical support. It has been wonderful. May it continue to flourish long into the future – and may we make the decisions and do the work that makes that possible.
