Easyfundraising

How have 8 people in St Lawrence and Bedmond managed to raise over £2,781 for our two churches without most people knowing that they were even fundraising for us?

They have used hardly any effort to do that and it has all been done in small increments. We are very grateful to them. All they do is that every time they shop online - some of them weekly, some of them at longer intervals - they do this by accessing the chosen retailer via easyfundraising and nominating us as their chosen charity. We have 53 people who sign up to easyfundraising to donate to us but they have not all remembered to do their shopping via the easy fundraising site. If you are one of these people it may be that you no longer shop online or it may be that we just need to give you a nudge to do your shopping via the easyfundraising.org site.

Every little helps us to pay for the essential work being done on the building or help to pay the heating bills. At this time of year you may be shopping more than at other times so this might come as a timely reminder.

The Forgotten Front – WW1

Over several months I have written about famous people buried in our churchyard. This month I am going to make it more personal and write about Ernest Higgs (1879 – 1945). It seems appropriate to write about him this month as Remembrance Day is very close. Ernest Higgs lived in Abbots Langley. He served in Salonika on what has been called 'The Forgotten Front' in Greece and North Macedonia. It was less intense than the Western Front leading to significant periods of boredom for the soldiers. The weather was either freezing cold in winter or boiling hot in summer. It did play a crucial role in the war's end by forcing Bulgaria to capitulate.

Ernest Higgs was the great grandfather of Nigel and Phillip Higgs. He left for Salonika (now Thessaloniki) in April 1915. He kept a diary for the time that he was away the family have a copy of the diary. This is how the diary started...

"After a lot of talking, at last I got the wife's consent to join up, as I then thought it the duty of every able bodied man to do so. Of course it was natural the wife did not like me leaving home, while so many single men were strolling about. And I was leaving five kiddies at home and another expected very shortly. Also I was leaving good employment."

Nigel and I recently visited Salonika with the Salonika Campaign Society to see the places where he served. He was a 'Driver' but not a driver of vans or tanks but a driver of mules. He looked after the mules and when there was food, ammunition, equipment or other supplies to be collected or moved around he would be off with the mules to collect it. There were frequent visits to the railway station as supplies came in that way. Mules and horses were a vital means of transport as the terrain was not suitable for tanks. The two valleys of the Struma and the Vardar rivers had very steep sides. The wide valley floors were wet, ideal for mosquitoes. In this area more soldiers died of malaria then died from the fighting.

On the 3rd November 1915 the diary entry was...

'At a few hours notice we were transferred to the 10th Divisional train at Basingstoke for overseas and while there stood by under six hours notice to move. Were not even allowed home a few hours before leaving old England.'

Ernest became sick in September 1916 with dysentery and malaria and was then sent home via Alexandria arriving back in Bristol and eventually Abbots Langley in February 1917. He did not die in a foreign land but is buried in St Lawrence churchyard.

On Remembrance Sunday we remember all those who served in the many conflicts.

They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

From the Curate

Friendship and Loneliness

I was recently at a Diocesan training course where the course leader mentioned something that surprised me: teenagers, according to recent research, have one of the highest levels of loneliness in our society – more so even than many older people living alone. We often assume that loneliness is a problem that comes only in later years, when friends or spouses have died and families live far away. But the truth is more complex. Loneliness is not simply about being on your own. You can be surrounded by people at school, at work, or even at church, and still feel desperately lonely.

That distinction – between being alone and being lonely – is important. Being alone is a state of life: it simply describes whether there are others physically present. Some people enjoy solitude; indeed, it can be nourishing and refreshing. But loneliness is a feeling of disconnection. It's the ache of not being known or not being understood. It's the fear that, even in a crowded room, no one really sees you. And it can happen to the young as well as the old, the busy as well as the retired, the outwardly extroverted as well as the shy.

At the heart of what makes us human is the need for connection. The Bible lets us know early doors, that, "... it is not good for the man to be alone." That doesn't mean we must all be in romantic relationships, but it does mean we are made for relationships. Friendship particularly is one of God's good gifts



to us – yet we don't always give them the attention and care they deserve. They are often overlooked in favour of romantic relationships.

The Bible gives us some good examples of deep and lifegiving friendships. Think of Ruth and Naomi. Ruth's words to her mother-inlaw are some of the most moving in the Bible – "Where you go, I will go; where you stay, I will stay. Your people will be my people and your God my God." Ruth binds her future to Naomi's, not out of obligation but as a free choice, out of loyalty and love. In our culture today, where people often move away for work or other opportunities, that determination to stand by someone through thick and thin is deeply countercultural – and deeply needed.

Or think of David and Jonathan. Despite the pressures of politics, rivalry, and even Jonathan's father Saul trying to kill David, the two formed an intense and heartfelt friendship. Jonathan supports David at personal cost, and David mourns Jonathan deeply. Their friendship is a reminder that real love between friends is not second-rate when compared to romantic love — it can be just as powerful and just as life-shaping.

The Bible honours friendship as a vital part of human flourishing, and philosophers have tended to agree. Aristotle wrote about three kinds of friendship: those based on utility (what you get out of it), those based on pleasure (simply enjoying one another's company), and the highest form —

friendship of virtue – where two people are committed to the good of one another's souls. Cicero, the Roman statesmen, put it even more strongly: "Friendship improves happiness and abates misery, by the doubling of our joy and the dividing of our grief." Friendship, at its best, means we do not face life's storms alone.

And yet, many of us do. Technology can help us stay connected, but it can also give the illusion of closeness while leaving us emotionally hungry. 'Liking' one another's posts doesn't mean we're sharing our lives with each other, not really. Social media encourages us to gather acquaintances but we struggle to sustain real friendships.

What can we do? One answers is to attend to our friendships intentionally, as a matter of Christian faith. Jesus calls us his friends – "I no longer call you servants... but I have called you friends." (John 15:15). Friendship is at the heart of God's own relationship with us, and we are called to mirror that love in our lives with others. Friendships don't just happen by accident—they need tending, like a garden. That means making time, even when life is busy. It means being willing to pick up the phone, to write the message, to invite someone for coffee. It means showing loyalty when a friend is struggling, even if they are not easy company.

It also means courage. To move beyond surface-level small talk requires a willingness to be honest, to admit need, to share something of ourselves. Loneliness often thrives where there is shame: "If people really knew me, they wouldn't want to." True friendship contradicts that lie. In Christ, we are

already known and loved, and that frees us to risk being known and loved by others.

Friendship has another dimension too. It isn't just for our comfort—it also calls us outwards. A strong circle of friends can become a clique if it only turns inwards. The Christian vision of friendship is one that always has space at the table for one more. As St Augustine wrote, "In this world two things are essential: life and friendship. Both must be cherished and not undervalued." If we take him seriously, then friendship is not a luxury but a necessity—something that binds us to others and makes life worth living.

So perhaps the challenge for us, as a church, is twofold. First, to nurture our own friendships, not treating them as optional extras but as gifts of God's grace. Second, to notice those who are lonely and to offer them the gift of friendship—not a quick handshake at the Peace, but genuine interest, patience, and time. It might be the teenager who feels adrift in a sea of social media pressure, or the new parent struggling to cope, or the elderly neighbour quietly watching television alone each night. Friendship in Christ has the power to transform all of those lives.

Loneliness is one of the quiet epidemics of our age. But the good news is that God has already given us the antidote. He calls us into his friendship, and he calls us to be friends to one another. May we attend to that calling with faithfulness, with courage, and with joy.

The Friends of St Lawrence

Since the last edition of Outlook, the Friends have had two very successful events... the G&S Concert and the Quiz Evening

The G&S Evening "Where it all Began" on Sat 27th September was a huge success. It was wonderful to recall the beginnings of the Abbots Langley G&S Society in St Lawrence where it all began 75 years ago. 
