#### **Our Malawi visit: Part 2**

In the June edition of Outlook, I outlined some of the work and visits undertaken by our team of eight; Eileen and David Adams, Mags Curtis, Lesley Inwards (St Peter's), Catherine Evans (who used to attend St Lawrence's before she moved) Gordon Cocks (a retired builder), Michel Sram (our French Chef!) and me. This month I will be describing two events that were among the highlights of our visit as well as reporting back on the progress of some of projects we have supported.

#### YOUTH OPEN DAY AND FOOTBALL BONANZA

As well as the renovation and decoration work that the team carried out at St Luke's Hospital, Malosa, we were also very much involved in visiting community projects that have been set up by the Hospital's Primary Healthcare Co-ordinator, Mrs Nellie Walamwa. In June's Outlook, I explained that the hospital is working alongside Community Based Organisations CBOs (health and community centres) in order to improve the health and wellbeing of people in the hospital's catchment area. The most pressing issues that Nellie and her Primary Healthcare Department are engaged with are food and nutrition, under-fives wellbeing, teenage pregnancies and HIV. In order to highlight these issues and to get the hospital's message across to as many people as possible, Nellie organised two very special occasions. The Youth Open Day was an amazing event! It was held in the grounds of one of the local schools. The focus was on teenage pregnancy and HIV. As the children had all been let out of school early to attend, there was a captive audience! There was plenty to entertain the youngsters and their parents with traditional Malawian

dancing and music, some very realistic acting as well as popular music and dancing. Everyone joined in and had great fun. However, there were very serious and powerful messages given out to the audience throughout the day as the hospital staff pressed their points home through music and drama. Speeches were made by the hospital management team to reinforce the messages and as honoured guests for the afternoon, we too gave a speech, to add weight to the proceedings. In a society where there is little television or social media, such an event is an effective way of putting across essential information on public health and in this instance reached an audience of around 2.000 people. The Football Bonanza was likewise an outstanding event. The focus of the day was a netball and football final and as it was a public holiday it was attended by around 5,000 people. In the lead up to our visit, there had been knockout matches played by the youth groups attached to 12 of the Community Based Organisations and we were to be present when the final games were played. During play there was a commentary given through the loudspeakers not only commenting on the match but giving a constant message about teenage pregnancy, HIV and food nutrition. At the end of the afternoon, speeches were given by the hospital's senior management team and we presented footballs to the youth groups and cooking pots and equipment to 13 CBOs. Once again, it was a brilliant way of getting an important message across to an audience through a fun and enjoyable afternoon.

Malosa Secondary School: As well as visiting the hospital in Malosa, we made a trip to the Secondary School. On this visit we were invited to meet with teachers from the school and to have

lunch with them. We were made most welcome by the school and it was good to talk to the teachers and learn about the issues they face and the challenges of teaching with little or no resources or equipment. It was also a good opportunity for us to look round and to see the partially built classroom block that needs finishing with window frames and roofing panels that we have been asked to provide.

**Previous Projects:** One of the reasons for our trip to Malawi is to check up on the progress of the projects that we have supported and we are pleased to be able to report back on some of these. After 10 years, the clinic at Nkasala is still providing effective and quality maternity care and the numbers using the clinic are good and the mortality rate continues to improve. The building is in good repair though we noted that some of the mattresses on the beds needed replacing. We were, however, disappointed to note that the pump for the borehole at **Mposa had broken.** We have asked for a report from the contractor to see what the problem is and once we understand the issues involved we will discuss whether we can help. At St Luke's Hospital, the new dentist's chair that we purchased is looking good and we have some super pictures of it with a patient in situ! The tailoring project that we helped to set up in 2018 is still going strong. It was initially set up for orphans who would be trained in a skill for life. We bought 2 sewing machines for the 4 students on the course. Today the number of students is 33 and it has been opened up to youngsters who are in need of employment. The course is highly successful though they are still learning on the original 2 machines that we bought for them 6 years ago! Lastly, the chicken project has morphed into goats! The chickens were hard to keep and didn't

flourish so with the money they had left from selling the chickens and eggs, they built up a small number of goats, for milk as well as use for meat.

It was an amazing visit and our friendship with the staff at the hospital and school has been strengthened and renewed. But, perhaps the greatest highlight of all, was seeing the joy on people's faces and the cheers we received when we started every speech with ... "We bring you greetings from our village in the UK"! It brought it home to us, just how much it means to the people of Malosa that people thousands of miles away care about them and their welfare. The comment below is taken from the report that the Hospital's Principal Administrator, Mr Winasai Boma and the Primary Healthcare Co-ordinator, Mrs Nellie Walamwa wrote:-

"It was amazing and wonderful to have you here at Malosa. Your visit was really a blessing and it has changed a lot of things at both our hospital and the community. We strongly believe that your visit has also brought an impact on people's lives as well as the community at large. You may agree with us that the people were so excited after seeing you and learning that you supported all those activities. They are very grateful to you and they are looking forward to seeing you again in your next visit. We are also very thankful because your visit has cemented the existing relationship between the hospital and the community among other things. The financial and material support has also expanded our activities and support to various projects in the communities around St Luke's Hospital. We will be updating you on the ongoing projects as they progress. You are an amazing team, hard working and cheerful givers, may God continue to bless you"

All of this stretches our finances, we are, therefore, working on ways of fundraising for this necessary need, along with the need of more finances for the general running costs of the charity. You can see, therefore, why gifts and

donations like yours mean so much to us at this time.

So once again let me thank you all as a church for your generosity, and for those individuals in the congregation who have volunteered and supported us in so many ways. Thank you, your support makes a huge impact.

#### From the Curate

Six weeks ago, after a day of fevered speculation, a sodden Rishi Sunak announced the date of the next general election. And so, for the last few weeks Rishi, Keir and Ed et al have been vying for our votes. Whether you're excited by the kerfuffle of an election, or ready for it to all be over, it is crucial to remember the importance of our participation. Our votes are our voices, shaping the future of our country and ensuring that our values are represented in the halls of power. For those of us who profess faith in Jesus, it is particularly important to engage thoughtfully and prayerfully in this process, reflecting on how our choices align with our faith and the teachings of Jesus.

Obviously, that is somewhat easier said than done. Unlike some of our counterparts in the USA – also in the grip of election fever - Christians in the UK do not vote as a bloc. The last time there was a general election in the UK, in 2019, approximately 52 percent of the population were counted Christians by the British Social Attitudes Survey, but only four to eight percent attend church regularly. Although surveys indicate that Christians in the UK are more likely to vote than the general population, they do not vote for the same party. Historically Anglicans have tended to skew towards the Conservatives, and Romans Catholics towards Labour, but these allegiances have been in decline over the last few decades.

When considering the relationship of Christians to politics, it is natural to look towards scripture. Is it biblical to vote? What does the bible teach us about politics? Firstly, obviously, the concept of a democracy where citizens cast votes



for their political leader did not exist in biblical times. And when the Israelite's did insist on a human king, the Lord acquiesced but did not arrange elections, instead assigning a priest to anoint a king. There is though within scripture clear instructions about our role and relationship to our leaders and government. We are instructed to seek the welfare of the place in which we reside (Jeremiah 29:4-7), we are instructed to pay our taxes (Mark 12:17), to be salt and light to those around us (Matthew 5:13-16), to pray for our leaders (1 Timothy 2:1-2), and to honour them (1 Peter 2:13 & 17).

Most importantly, Jesus told us to love our neighbour, and if we intend to do that, we must care about the policies and laws which affect them. Voting is a chance to not only hold MPs to account, but to contribute to the common good for our society. With this in mind, what are some of the issues we should be paying attention to when we go to the polls? Here are four of the most important issues for me you might have others, and I encourage you to prayerfully reflect on what they might be.

#### Welfare

Some of us are fortunate enough to never have been in serious need, but for others not having enough is a daily reality. The reasons people find themselves in poverty or crisis are complicated and various. And what of global poverty? International aid has barely featured in debates in this election but is an obvious moral issue facing the next government. In Luke 3, John the Baptist says to the crowds, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none, and whoever has food must do likewise." It can be tempting in an election to vote for the party which will benefit us most, but following Jesus means looking out for those who have the least.

#### Stewardship of Creation

In the story of the garden of Eden, we hear that humans are placed in the garden to 'till it and keep it.' The Hebrew word 'till' is the normal Hebrew word to serve, and the word 'keep' mean to guard or watch over. Humankind is entrusted with the care and tending of the earth, and as stewards of God's creation, we have a responsibility to care for the environment. When choosing our candidates, we should consider whether they will help us to meet this responsibility.

#### **Matters of Conscience**

When voting, it is crucial to consider MPs positions of significant ethical issues, such as abortion and assisted dying. These topics have profound moral implications and directly impact society's perception of the sanctity of life. Of course, even amongst Christians there are a variety of opinions and stances on these issues, but it's important to know where those vying for our votes stand. Votes in Parliament on ethical issues such as these are traditionally free votes, and so it's worth finding out candidates' positions on such topics.

#### Migration

Jesus tells us that '...just as you did it to one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did it for me." When thinking of who in our society, is counted the least, those fleeing conflict and other disasters come readily to mind. When we vote it is important to consider candidate's positions on migration. Migration policies affect countless lives and reflect our nation's values of compassion, hospitality and justice. As Christians, we are called to welcome the stranger and care for the vulnerable.

This is just a snapshot of the key issues for me, and I encourage you to prayerfully think about your key issues: perhaps economics, defence, housing, prison reform, or any number of issues. Few of these issues have obvious solutions, and even within the faith community we will disagree as to the best course of action. But it's important to engage in healthy debate on these issues and others, and to disagree well when we do.

As we stand at the crossroads of another election, let us remember that our participation is not only a civic duty but a moral and spiritual responsibility. By voting, we are given a powerful opportunity to influence the future of our nation in a way that reflects the teachings of Jesus. Whether you have already cast your vote or are preparing to do so, consider which issues are most important to you, and how they relate to your own faith. Let us seek God's guidance in our decision making, aiming to create a society rooted in justice, compassion, and love for our neighbours. In doing so, we honour the teachings of Jesus and contribute to the common good of our community and nation.

#### **D-Day**

The 6th of June 2024 marked the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has ever witnessed. In 1944, Operation Overlord saw over 5,000 ships and landing craft set down more than 130,000 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe.

Many long time residents of Bedmond and Abbots Langley may remember the Gentle family who lived at Broadgreen House before Janette and John Noonan. Some will also remember Harry Gentle, Master Carpenter, Jack's Father ,who lived at the top of Toms Lane. Others will remember his late wife Audrey as School Librarian at Langleybury. They had both been very involved with Kings Langley Players, and I was their frequent baby-sitter and also helped the 3 children-Sarah, Tom & Matthew with swimming.

Jack died peacefully in late May at the age of 93 in Norfolk, where he had moved after Audrey died. Unbeknown to

us, Audrey had asked Jack to give John and I first refusal to buy Broadgreen House, and we eventually moved in in June 1985, when Holly was just 3 years old!

John and I attended Jack's Celebration of Life Service recently in a Woodland setting at Colney, just outside Norwich, close to where Jack lived with his second wife June. It was a most unique, uplifting and original service with close family sharing wonderful memories of different aspects of Jack's multi-faceted life, as well as Jack's chosen music and poetry. He will be hugely missed by all who knew him. He was special!

May he rest in peace.
