# A Visit to the Hospice of St Francis

A couple of months ago, a small group from St Lawrence, including members of our Bereavement Visiting Team and myself, had the privilege of visiting the Hospice of St Francis in Berkhamsted — the charity that received the proceeds from this year's church fete. It was a deeply moving and inspiring visit, and we wanted to share something of what we saw.

We were warmly welcomed by Sarah, one of the hospice team, who gave us a tour and helped us understand more of the work they do. The first thing that struck us was the setting. The hospice is nestled in beautiful grounds: a peaceful garden with seating areas, summer houses, and a gentle water feature surrounding by countryside views. It is the sort of place where you immediately feel able to breath.

Inside, we were shown some of the facilities for both staff and guests, including the chapel — a simple,

prayerful space. On one of its walls is a striking memorial display, with the names of loved ones who have died. It is a tender reminder of the lives remembered there and the care that continues for families long after a death.

Although the hospice has space to care for up to eight patients at a time, we learned that much of their work now happens in people's homes, offering support, expertise, and comfort where it is most needed. The charity receives very little funding from sources such as the NHS, and relies largely on donations and volunteer-led support.

It was wonderful to see first-hand the difference that our fundraising helps to make. The Hospice of St Francis is a place of compassion, dignity, and hope — and we are proud to support their work. More information about the hospice can be found at www.stfrancis.org.uk.

#### **Robins**

There are many myths and legends surrounding one of Britain's favourite wild birds. As a traditional symbol of Christmas, the robin has been appearing on cards since the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

We have robins in our gardens, in the churchyard at St Lawrence and in the area around the Church of the Ascension at Bedmond all year round although numbers are boosted as some robins also migrate to this country to escape the harsh European winters. Maybe we also notice them more in the winter as they come to bird tables and as they are more visible once the leaves have fallen off of the trees. Robins are also one of the first birds to sing in the dawn chorus and they sing at twilight too. They are fiercely territorial and singing is a way of marking their territory as well as a way of attracting a mate.

These are a couple of the Christian myths associated with robins which you may or may not have heard. It was said that a robin pulled a thorn from Christ's head when he was on the cross, wearing a crown of thorns and it was Christ's blood that stained the robin's breast red. It was also said that St Serf of Kinross, who lived in Scotland in the sixth century, was befriended by a robin. Every time he prayed, the bird would sit on his shoulder. However, one of his disciples, who was jealous of St Serf, killed the bird. One of Serf's followers. his foster-son, Kentigern, prayed over the robin and brought it back to life. Kentigern became St Mungo and went on to found Glasgow Cathedral.

But what was the origin of robins appearing on our Christmas cards?



The first robins appeared on Christmas cards in the 1880s, as a result of the bright red uniforms worn by Royal Mail postmen. The British public nicknamed them "robins". As members of the public awaited the postman's arrival, especially at Christmas, when they were expecting cards from family and friends who lived far away, they would be delighted to see the "robin" walking up the garden path. Hence Christmas cards in the 1880s began to show a colourful drawing of a postman in his bright red coat, carrying a sack of mail. As he was nicknamed the "robin", some artists drew a picture of a real robin, chirpily carrying a Christmas card in his beak. This cemented the robin's association with Christmas and today, the humble bird is an integral part of the festive season more than 130 years later, with his image appearing on millions of Christmas cards.

#### From the Vicar

My first mince pie this year came three weeks ago - and the next day I heard that Wham! song again for the first time. The Christmas season, it seems, has thoroughly begun.

Except of course, it hasn't. One of the problems of doing Christmas too early is that you miss some distinctive December notes.

Like, for instance, December 8th. Roman Catholics call this day the Feast of the Immaculate Conception; Anglican prayerbooks are more coy, simply describing it as the Conception of the Virgin Mary. It marks the very beginning of Mary's life – not, as is often mistakenly assumed, that of Jesus. From early in the Church's life, certainly by the fifth century, many Christians sensed that there was a great mystery in the conception of Mary, worth pondering and celebrating.

After many centuries of reflection, the Roman Catholic Church declared in 1854 that belief in the 'Immaculate Conception' of Mary was *de fide* – an integral part of Christian faith which a fully orthodox believer must accept. The claim is that from the very beginning of Mary's life, she was never affected by 'original sin' – that the broken, messed up, sinful nature all of us share was not shared by her. God's grace preserved her from this from the very moment of her conception. Her human nature, uniquely, is what God always wanted it to be.



Nearly all Anglicans, like nearly all Protestants, have not wanted to say this. And they have certainly denied that it is an essential part of full Christian belief. This is partly because they (we) have said that if something is not clearly taught in Scripture, it cannot be de fide - and nobody claims that the Immaculate Conception is obvious from the Bible. There's also a general Protestant scepticism re saints, and any sense that there might be intermediaries between humanity and God other than Jesus Christ. We've tended to think that Roman Catholics make a great deal too much fuss about Mary, and have seen the idea of her Immaculate Conception as a prime example of this. Surely, we've often said, Mary is a sinner just like us?

We should note, however, just how shocking that last statement would be to most of the Christian world. By as early as the fourth century, the overwhelming Christian consensus would have been horrified by the idea that Mary is 'a sinner, just like us.' Augustine refused to even countenance the possibility. Centuries later – surprisingly and awkwardly for his Protestant successors – Martin Luther took the same stance. Indeed, for most of Christian history the only debate about Mary and sin turned

on precisely when God had made her sinless. Was it at the very beginning of her existence (the 'immaculate conception') or at some later point — whilst still in her mother's womb, at birth, or even later at the Annunciation? Whenever it was, she wasn't a sinner just like us: our contemporary disdain for Mary is something of an anomaly in Christian history.

Why have most Christians wanted to make these startling affirmations about Mary? It all stems from thinking deeply on her role as the Theotokos - the Godbearer or, as it is usually translated in the West, the Mother of God. That title, incidentally, is not some weird Roman extravagance – that Mary is truly the Mother of God is basic Christian orthodoxy. The one who begins to be in her womb at the Annunciation is none other than God incarnate. He is no mere inspired man: He is God translating Himself into human existence. The one who gives birth to Him is the Mother of God.

And what does that mean? As the great Anglican theologian Jeremy Taylor said, it's not just a matter of receiving him – as a purse might receive and hold a coin. No, Mary conceives him. That is, he really comes from her: his flesh, his bone, his blood, his brain – it is all of her. She not only gives birth to Christ, she gives rise to Christ. And this has made many Christians ask: would the incarnate God choose not only to reside within, but to derive his human existence from, a corrupted, fallen source? No, the reply has come, God will have formed a woman worthy to be the God-bearer. The human being from whom God's own humanity comes, will be the kind of human being God always

wanted – a full, free, glorious, sinless new Eve.

What else, after all, did the angel Gabriel mean at the Annunciation with that greeting: 'Hail Mary, full of grace'? Was he just paying an exaggerated compliment? The more Catholicminded side of the Christian tradition has said 'no': she really was *full of* grace. She needed to be, to give her radical, free, open-hearted consent to God (who, it is emphasised, would not become incarnate without her consent: her 'yes' is to that extent necessary for our salvation!). And if she was full of grace, there was no room for sin in her life. The Bible may tell us nothing about Mary's conception, but it does tell us how, for example, God prepared the prophet Jeremiah even in the womb for his mission (Jer. 2:5). Yet compared to Mary, his role in salvation is minor. If God fashioned him from the very beginning, how much more so will He have done for the Theotokos?

Well – we're Anglicans. Part of the point of being Anglican is to say that none of this can be *de fide*. Good Christians can and will disagree about it. Perhaps, however, one good use of our Advent might be to reflect on whether we might have something serious to learn from most of the Christian world, and come to see that there really is something quite astonishing about Mary. Why not use December 8th for just such thinking?

# **Looking back at ALGSS**

Articles from the Parish Magazines of 1950 and 1951 describing the foundation of the Abbots Langley Gilbert and Sullivan Society by our Founder, the Vicar, the Revd Raymond Wilkinson

He writes:

#### September 1950-

**Amateur Operatics** There will be an open meeting, to which all interested people are invited, at 7.30 pm on Tuesday 12<sup>th</sup> September, in the Village Hall, to explore the possibilities of forming an Amateur Operatic Society in the Village, and it is my hope that such a Society, if formed will be able to produce a Gilbert and Sullivan Opera next Spring. To my mind there is no more rewarding pleasure than the staging of such operas, which are universally loved and are so much of a national institution. It has been made clear to me that such a venture wuld have the backing of many local people of musical ability, and I hope that this meeting will see the proposed Society become an established fact.

#### October 1950

Amateur Operatics Following upon a most enthusiastic initial meeting, the newly-formed local Amateur Operatic Society has got away to an immediate start in rehearsing every Monday from 8 to 10pm in the Village Hall for the production of "The Mikado" next Spring. Forty members have already joined and any "voices" will be very much welcomed. Anyone possessing vocal scores which they will lend will

put us in their debt. Copies may be left at the Vicarage and good care will be taken of them.

#### December 1950

**An Advance Notice** The Abbots Langley Gilbert and Sullivan Society, which has been enthusiastically rehearsing "The Mikado" for the past three months, is to stage the production at Leavesden Hospital all with its superb stage and accommodation, during the week commencing 29th January. Tickets for the production will be available in early January, and a first class production with an entirely local solo lead, is promised. The Watford Light Orchestra will accompany. It is rumoured that some well known local personalities will be seen in a completely new guise!

#### **March 1951**

The Mikado The Abbots Langley Gilbert and Sullivan Society's first "stupendous production" was for so long the main topic of conversation in the Village and so fully reported on by the Press that further serious comment would be superfluous,

And so it all began! and has continued to flourish for the last 75 years.

To celebrate we are once again presenting The Mikado and it promises to be another "stupendous production" We still have very strong links with St Lawrence among our fine soloists.. Pooh Bah, Katisha, Pitti Sing and Peep

# Malawi Update

#### The Container

Wednesday November 19th saw the Malawi Team working flat out packing items for the container bound for Malawi via our dropping off point in Leicester. We are particularly grateful to the Scouts for allowing us to use the Scout Hut in Langley Road to carry out our mission. The day started at 8.30am putting out all the tables to receive the donated items for sorting before packing into rubble bags and then all the bags have to be registered and labelled. It is a mammoth task! We packed nearly 100 bags and packages! The hall was booked till 5pm and we finished all the packing by one minute to five!!

Thank you to all the people who came to help the team with the packing, we most definitely could not have done it without you! We had teams sorting and packing baby and children's clothes, knitwear, hospital equipment and school equipment and then at the end of the day a team to pack the van. The next day David and Eileen drove a packed van to Leicester, a new storage depot for us. This year, the Birmingham Diocese hasn't sent a container to Malawi as a result of the difficulties they have had with the journey through Mozambique and their agent in Malawi, instead they have found a new carrier for this year only and we have used them. This means that the container won't leave the UK immediately and they will notify us when the load is full and ready to undertake the journey to Malawi. We will keep you up to date on its progress

We would like to give a huge thank you to all those people who have contributed to the container in so many different ways. People have been so generous with their donated items and we were able to send a large variety of equipment to the hospital, school and community. Thank you to those who have made and knitted clothes, to those who have so thoughtfully collected items and to those who have given monetary donations... everything we send will be so gratefully received by the hospital, school, and community in Malosa. THANK YOU EVERYONE ... we couldn't have done it without you!!
