### **Messy Church**



### **Duke of Edinburgh Award**

In the last academic year the churchyard working party was joined by Arash who was working towards his Bronze Duke of Edinburgh award. In order to achieve this award students have to be between 14 and 24 years old. There are three progressive levels – the Bronze, Silver and Gold awards.

The awards were founded by Prince Phillip in 1956 with the aim of giving young people the opportunity to develop skills, get fitter, help others and experience adventure. Participants have to show that they can develop a new skill or improve an existing one; dedicate time to helping in their community; engage in physical activity to improve their well being and fitness and undertake a journey often involving walking and camping to develop their teamwork, navigation and problem solving skills.

### Yvonne Stanley – Practice Manager at Vine House Medical Centre

Yvonne was born in Watford General Hospital and lived in West Watford until she was 15. Her father came from Rickmansworth and her mother from Islington, they met at a dance in Watford Town Hall. She has an older sister. When she was 15 the family moved to North Watford and Yvonne, who had learnt to play the piano, joined a local Marching Band. She transferred her keyboard skills to playing the xylophone and marimba and was a member of this band until she was 21. The band played in some prestigious venues – the Royal Albert Hall, Wembley Arena and the Birmingham National Indoor Arena. It was while playing in the band that she met her husband who played the Contra Bass. At the age of 21, at the upper age for membership of the band Yvonne then taught small children to play.

As a child Yvonne attended Chater School and then went on to Westfield Secondary School before moving at 16 to West Herts College to study for her A Levels, one of which was History.

Her first job after leaving college was as a trainee manager at W H Smith's in the Harlequin where she worked in both the general office and the cash office. She then moved to the head office of Hilton Hotels in the finance department. Yvonne then spent 10 happy years working for Camelot until, like many of the workforce there at the time, she was made redundant. Her next post was with Deloitte, a professional services



company where she changed direction from finance to HR, a role she continued with in a move to T-Systems, an IT service provider where she was Head of HR services. During this period, she dealt with a lot of international

HR issues as well as local ones.

Yvonne resigned from work when she was pregnant with her first child and decided to have a career break, her son was born in 2013 and her daughter in 2015. In 2016 she began working as a receptionist at Vine House Health Centre and after a year started doing medical reports and letters. In 2022 she became Deputy Practice Manager and a year later took on her present role of Practice Manager. The role entails ensuring that the Practice is ready to provide NHS services to all its patients.

Although her work keeps her very busy Yvonne loves being outdoors and walking and being with the family. She also enjoys reading, particularly history books and biographies. In her History A Level, the focus had been on The World since 1945, so this period is a source of great interest to Yvonne. She also enjoys knitting as a relaxing hobby. Another interest is Formula 1 racing and, before the children were born, she went to quite a few races. For her 40<sup>th</sup> birthday, her husband took her to Monaco to watch the Grand Prix. ### From the Vicar

Suddenly, overnight, in the mid-September, there were flags all along the High Steet: Union flags and St. George's Crosses.

What were they doing there? Many people weren't sure. There was no major sporting tournament going on; VJ Day was more than a month ago, and surely the Duchess of Kent was not such a major royal figure that her death could account for it?

Still, whatever the reason, flags are lovely, aren't they? They're about love of country, about our belonging together, having some bigger shared purpose than just our private interests. It's great to see them up there, fluttering in the breeze.

Well... sort of. Yes. There is something moving, I've always found, about watching the Union flag flying over Parliament, or at our great national occasions. It is a symbol of patriotism, and although patriotism sometimes gets a bad rap – 'the last refuge of the scoundrel', as the sceptical Samuel Johnson said – it is a good thing to love one's country. We could probably do with a bit more patriotism.

And yet... those flags in the High Street aren't just spontaneous expressions of a warm and noble love for the country. Or, if they are, it is a very striking coincidence that they went up just as the national campaign 'Raise the Colours: A Grassroots Movement for Unity and Patriotism' was launched. Its goal: to cover the country with the flags. Do have a look at its very professional



website and videos. One features a song with lyrics such 'as patience wearing thin / promises broken again / smoke, fire, flares going up / I'd rather die than give up the fight'. Meanwhile there's images showing 'Stop the Boats' banners, and men standing on the white cliffs of Dover with a large Union Flag inscribed with the words 'Charlie Kirk RIP'. Another video features Churchill's great speech, 'We shall fight them on the beaches... we shall never, never surrender.'

These are revealing choices. They imply that we're in a situation analogous to 1940. That our nation is under threat, that the warning beacons need to be lit, that we need to stand up and fight ... that while we're not (yet) at actual war, there's certainly a kind of desperate cultural struggle underway. The campaign wants you to think there's an enemy out there, and to link that thought to small boats and immigration and strangers. And they want you to think it's time to fight back.

Of course not everyone who put up the flags thinks all this. There's a huge variety of reasons why people put flags up, and why people like them. Many of the reasons, and many of the people, are fine and noble. However, let's not be naïve: some of what's happened is

absolutely about stirring up a drumbeat of anger, and fear, and hostility. And that is why for all that many people loved them, others are anxious, uncomfortable and – as one person said to me – 'almost physically sick' when they see our High Street like that. These people tend to keep their views quiet, because they fear that anything less than enthusiasm for the flags will be met by scorn, that they'll somehow be considered less British for their unease. That fact alone should make us pause and wonder: has our flag somehow become a bullying thing?

You might think all this an hysterical over-reaction. Plenty of European countries fly their flags way more than we do, and they're all fine. No-one accuses them of racism or bigotry. Well, maybe – although exactly those accusations are growing now, with some justification, all across Europe. My misgivings are more shaped by being born and raised in Ulster. Northern Ireland has always flown the flags, way more than the English do – and believe me, it is not the sign of a happy society. Be careful when your streets start to look like Belfast, and beware of those who want to take you there.

At the heart of the Union Flag there are three crosses, of St. George, St. Andrew, and St. Patrick - the crosses of the three kingdoms (poor old Wales, being a principality, doesn't get one!). That fact is something well worth reflecting on. What does the Cross mean, after all? Well, it's the sign of a God who refused to fight, who refused to despise, who laid his life down in sacrifice. It's the sign of reconciliation: as St. Paul put it, of how Christ 'is our

peace, (and) has broken down the dividing wall, the hostility between us' (Ephesians 2:14). It is the sign of enemies turned into friends, and of forgiveness. In other words, it is the very last sign that should be used to feed people's darker energies – their prejudices, resentments, and anger – and to carve people up into 'us' and 'them'. Jesus wept.

Of course small boats are a problem. The huge level of legal immigration is even more so, with all its implications for community cohesion, housing, public services and more (though, as any economist will tell you, these are complicated questions!). It is not racist to worry about these things, or to feel unease about how our country is changing – nor, even, about wanting to pull some of that change back. However, if we've any claim at all to being Christian – if that Cross at the heart of our flag means anything to us – our response to all this needs to start from the premiss that the people concerned are not our enemies. That He died for them, as He did for us. That they matter as much as we do. That they are the beloved children of God. And those who would make you fear them, despise them, and perhaps ultimately fight them ... well, they have missed the point of the Cross they salute.



### The Tale of the Crab Apple Jelly

Some of you might remember Anna Grayson who used to live in the village, Anna describes herself as a former writer and broadcaster now working as an artist mainly in ceramics and photography. Anna left Abbots Langley and now lives in Devon. She was featured on Grayson Perry's Art Club which I used to watch on Channel 4 during COVID. She is also a well known geologist. Anyway, what has all this got to do with crab apples, I can hear you saying. Anna donated a crab apple tree to St Lawrence in memory of a loved one. It was planted in the churchyard near to the notice board that is close to the High Street. For many years the tree was more like a small shrub. It was growing, but growing very slowly having been planted next to several other trees that dwarfed it. Well, three or four years ago one of the nearby trees got diseased and unfortunately, had to be removed. This meant that the crab apple tree suddenly had a lot more room and a lot more light. Aristotle said 'nature abhors a vacuum' and this was certainly true in this case. The little crab apple tree has now become significant and many of

you will have noticed that this year it had a bumper crop of crab apples. Anna Grayson was not only a member of our congregation but also a great supporter of the Abbots Langley



Garden Society and won many prizes at the Garden Society Shows. She had a dream that someone would one day make crab apple jelly from the crab apples on the tree that she had donated and that it would be entered into the Garden Society Show. Well this year, with the help of Doreen Higgs we were able to make that dream come true for her. The jelly was duly made and entered into the show and it won first prize.



She sent us a note from Devon to say that she was 'thrilled to bits'. She also sends love to everyone in Abbots Langley. She really misses Abbots Langley; there aren't any Garden Society Shows like ours in Devon. As the crab apples came from the churchyard it was fitting that we were all able to have a taste of the jelly after the 9.30am service on 14th September. The jars that Doreen Higgs made, including the prize winning jar, were sold to raise funds for Friends of St Lawrence. I also understand that one or two other people were able to pick some of the fruit, which is exactly what Anna intended when she donated the
