Malawi

THE FUTURE OF THE MALAWI PROJECT



Over the last few months, the Malawi Team have been considering the ongoing future of the Malawi Project and the need to include more people in the running of the Project. We have established strong links with the Hospital, School and community in Malosa since we started the Project in 2010 and the joy and support we bring to the people there is without question. However, the team is not getting any younger and we feel now is the time to involve more people and expand our operation in order to secure the future of this amazing project that we have set up.

THE TEAM'S ORGANISATION:



The Team Meetings: The Team meets roughly every 6 weeks. At these meetings we hear news from our contacts at the Hospital, School and community in Malosa with updates on the projects that we are supporting there. We consider requests that are sent to us from the Principal Hospital Administrator and the Headteacher as to what further projects we might help to

fund. One of our main activities at these meetings is to plan and organise fundraising events which we usually hold every couple of months.

The Container: Every year we buy space in a container organised by the Birmingham Diocese in order that we can send much needed items to the Hospital, School and community in Malosa. This takes up a large amount of time throughout the year organising the items to be sent and then there is the Herculean effort of sorting and packing these in the days before we drive everything up to Birmingham to put them in the container.



Getting the message across: An important aspect of the work the team does is to tell people about the Hospital, School and community in Malosa and the projects that we support. We have given talks to schools, youth groups, churches, village organisations, the U3A, the Masons and the Watford Lions. It is essential that people understand about those who live in places such a Malawi from people who have first hand knowledge. We are also aware that there are many other ways that we could be sharing our message by using social media etc. This is a part of the Project that we would like to expand.

Parish People

INGRID ALLEN - Library Manager at Abbots Langley Library

Ingrid was born in Hemel Hempstead but has spent all her life in Kings Langley. Her father worked at the Ovaltine Factory and her mother was a homemaker but also was a cleaner for a few chosen clients.

She attended Kings Langley School and obtained a BTEC in Business Studies.

She became a Saturday girl at British Home Stores in the food department and also provided holiday cover in the restaurant and clothing, department. Ingrid got married in 1983 and subsequently had two daughters and a son.

For two years from 1982 Ingrid worked for B Garrad Ltd (Educational Suppliers) in Kings Langley, as a Clerk Typist. She also had a 6-month period as Company Representative.

However, her career in the Library Service began in 1984 when she joined Kings Langley Library as Library Assistant – having contact with the general public, issuing and returning books, shelving, processing requests, unpacking and processing new stock. Assisting with the school visits and holiday activities. Working out and about with the Mobile Library vehicle. She was there for four years before starting her family and becoming a Registered Childminder. She ran a crèche for a keep fit class and helped in the classroom at Kings



Langley Primary School. During this period, she became a Saturday assistant at Abbots Langley Library. Then from 1996 for seven years she returned to Kings Langley Library. In October 2003 she was promoted to Library Manager (24 hours per week, increasing to 35 hours in March 2006). She also helped as a part-time Exam Invigilator (when not at the library).

From 2006 - 2011, as well as managing Kings Langley Library she acted as Cover Manager for Bovington Library. She also acted as Relief Manager for Berkhamsted and Tring Library whilst Kings Langley Library was closed (March to May 2011 for a refurbishment). In July 2011 she became Library supervisor for Tring Library (37 hours a week) after a restructure.

In November 2015, Ingrid was appointed Library Manager at Abbots Langley Library (30 Hours a week, after another restructure, within the service). She has developed the library since becoming Manager and made various changes.

For her hobbies Ingrid is a very keen gardener, loves cooking and reading

She also enjoys looking after her grandchildren every Wednesday. From April 2019 – April 2023 Ingrid was Church Warden at All Saints Church Kings Langley. This included a time when the church was without a vicar. During Covid she helped to set up and run Parish Pantry in All Saints Church for those in need of food due to the Covid 19 situation.

From 2001 to 2015 Ingrid was involved with catering for the Flower Festivals at All Saints Church Kings Langley at the end of October every year where they would provide about 60 lunches a day over the 3-day festival. This helped to raise valuable funds for the church.

Scouting has played a big part in Ingrid's life including meeting her husband of over 40 years, John, through the movement. Over the years she has been involved with Cubs, Scouts and Beavers. She now volunteers at large events at Phasels Wood Activity Centre, Kings Langley when they need additional help. Interestingly, both her daughters have met their husbands through the Scouting movement too.

Ingrid has received two community awards:

In 2012 One from Kings Langley Parish Council for services to the scouting movement and All Saints Church.

And in 2018, a Second from Abbots Langley Parish Council for outstanding achievement for services provided by Abbots Langley Library.

The library is thriving under Ingrid's management with many community activities taking place which are listed

at the end of this article. Ingrid is optimistic about the future of Abbots Langley Library and wants it to be established as a hub for the community.

Heresy 101: A Lent Journey Through Error and Truth

The lure of the forbidden has always held a strange fascination. As Geoffrey Chaucer put it in the fourteenth century, “Forbid us something, and that thing we desire.” Heresy, with its air of danger and rebellion, continues to intrigue. In an age of skepticism toward authority and tradition, many view heresy as the voice of the oppressed, suppressed by powerful institutions. And this was certainly the attitude of the popular *Da Vinci Code* series a few years ago. But is this really the case? Are heresies really just doctrines that were suppressed by a powerful church? And what can we learn by studying heresy?

Heresy, from the Greek word *hairesis*, originally meant an “act of choosing” which over time gradually developed the extended sense of “choice,” “a preferred course of action,” or “a school of thought.” Over time, it came to mean a departure from accepted Christian doctrine—errors that threatened to undermine the faith rather than uphold it. The early Church did not develop doctrine in a vacuum; it did so in response to challenges. Heresies were often well-meaning attempts to make sense of divine mysteries, but they ultimately distorted or destabilised the faith.

The Church’s response to heresies was not about suppressing difference for the sake of power. Rather, it was about safeguarding the truth that had been revealed in Jesus Christ. The creeds that we recite today, such as the Nicene



Creed, were shaped through this process—not as inventions of human authority but as the Church’s way of preserving the faith handed down by the apostles.

Why Study Heresy?

Religious orthodoxy often suffers from “familiarity fatigue.” We hear the same doctrines week after week, and they can lose their impact. Studying heresy forces us to look at orthodoxy with fresh eyes. When we see what went wrong in various heretical movements, we come to a deeper appreciation of what is right in Christian belief.

Heresy is like an error in an important equation. It might seem like a small miscalculation at first, but over time, it leads to profound distortions. By studying heresies, we not only learn from the mistakes of the past, but we also gain insight into why the core doctrines of Christianity are what they are.

The Heresy of Arianism

Take, for example, the heresy of Arianism.

Arianism was one of the most significant and dangerous heresies of the early Church. Named after Arius, a priest from Alexandria in the fourth century, this heresy denied the full divinity of Christ. Arius taught that Jesus was not eternal but was created by God as the highest of all creatures. In other words, Jesus was not God in the same way that the Father was.

At first glance, this might seem like a minor technicality. But the implications were enormous. If Jesus was not fully God, then the entire foundation of Christian salvation collapsed. The early Church understood that only God could reconcile humanity to himself. If Jesus was merely a creature, even an exalted one, then his death and resurrection could not achieve salvation in the way the apostles had proclaimed.

The Church responded to Arianism by affirming, in the Nicene Creed, that Jesus is "begotten, not made, of one being with the Father." This phrase—*homoousios* (of the same substance)—became the defining statement of Christian belief against Arianism. The controversy surrounding Arianism raged for decades, but the Church stood firm in proclaiming that Jesus was fully divine and fully human.

The Continuing Relevance of Heresy

Heresies are not just relics of the past. The same kinds of errors crop up in different forms throughout history. Even today, many people are drawn to ideas that subtly distort Christian teaching—sometimes in ways that make it more palatable to modern sensibilities. The idea that Jesus was just a great moral teacher but not divine,

for example, echoes Arianism. Similarly, the belief that we must earn God's love through good works echoes the ancient heresy of Pelagianism.

Understanding heresies helps us to be discerning in our own time. It reminds us that faith is not simply a collection of opinions but something rooted in the revelation of God in Christ and handed down to us through the apostles. It also teaches us humility—we are not immune to error, and we must always be careful to distinguish truth from distortion.

Heresy and the Journey of Faith

The early Church did not set out to create rigid systems of doctrine for the sake of control (as per The *Da Vinci Code*.) Instead, it sought to preserve the mystery of faith and protect it from ideas that would ultimately erode it. Doctrine, at its best, is not about limiting belief but about safeguarding what has been revealed.

This Lent, as we explore these ancient controversies, we will not only learn about the errors of the past but also deepen our understanding of the faith that has been handed down to us. Far from being dry theological disputes, these debates touch on the very heart of what it means to be a Christian.

Join us for Heresy 101 as we journey through the twists and turns of Christian history, discovering how the Church has wrestled with error and upheld the truth. Together, we will see how even the shadowlands of faith can lead us to a greater appreciation of the light.

Swift Boxes to be Fitted in the Belfry

We are excited to announce that later this month we will be installing 26 swift boxes in the belfry. In order to do this we had to have PCC agreement and then agreement from the Archdeacon once the PCC had said that they supported the idea.

We are very grateful to Gavin Vicary from the Hertford Swift group who has guided us through this process and has arranged the funding and made the boxes for us at no cost to the PCC. No two belfries are the same so they have had to be specially made to fit.

We do have swifts circling the tower every year and we have had a couple of them nest in the roof on the south side. It is unusual for them to nest on the south side of a church as it may get too hot.

The nest boxes we are adding will be on the west side of the belfry. They have been installed in other churches with great success. They are placed between the louvers. The advantages of church belfries are that they are high and out of the way and swifts seem to like nesting there. One thing that swifts seem to like is a degree of seclusion; the louvers in front of the swift box in the belfry provide this.

Unfortunately, they do not always take up residence in the first year but we will look into playing attraction calls as this will increase the chances of success and reduce the time taken to attract the first occupants.

These are some of the frequently asked questions and answers which appear on the Caring for God's Acre website....

Q: Can you see the boxes from outside the church?

A: The external appearance of the church will not be affected as they are fitted between the exiting louvers which remain in place.

Q: Will Swift boxes allow bats or other wildlife to enter the church?

A: As the nest boxes are sealed on the inside, no wildlife can get into the church.

Q: Do Swift droppings foul the church?

A: Unlike Starlings and House Martins, Swifts do not produce large amounts of 'white-wash'. Swifts are clean birds, the adults consume the chicks droppings, and very little in the way of droppings would be produced outside.

Q: Do boxes need to be cleaned out at the end of the season?

A: Swifts use minimal nesting material. Invertebrates reduce the material through the winter. It is not necessary, indeed it is bad practice, to clear a Swift's nest at the end of the breeding season, they need it for breeding the following year. However, if tits or sparrows have occupied the box, then it is a good idea to clear it out outside the breeding season.

Q: Does playing attraction calls disturb neighbours?

A: As the belfry is so high, most people do not even notice it and the calls will cease when the colony is established.

Q: Are Swifts affected by bell-ringing?

A: Swifts have been observed on video being momentarily startled when bells start to ring, they then soon settle down. Often they do not react at all.
