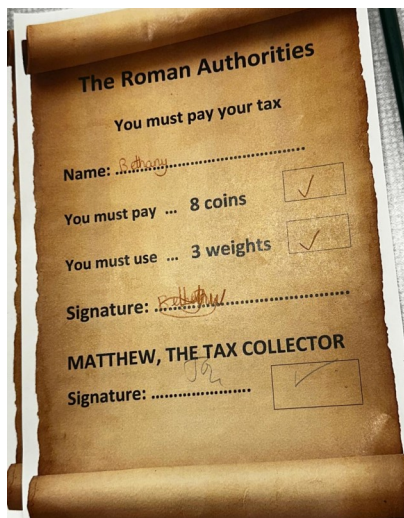

AND STILL THEY COME.....

On Christmas Eve in 1979 Brian Andrews, the then vicar of St Lawrence held a 'Donkey Service'. There were live animals and Mary and Joseph sat surrounded by straw and small children with lighted candles! It was said at the time that the Church Warden took to his bed and checked the fire insurance policy at the thought that another disastrous fire could envelope the church only ten years after the 1969 one. However, the service proved very popular and has grown and continued for forty six years. From that one service there are now five services on Christmas Eve and the church is always packed. There are no longer live animals except for the donkey, and the straw and candles no longer surround Mary and Joseph and the baby as Health and Safety regulations are now much stricter.

This year 1,680 people squeezed into church to hear the timeless story of the birth of Jesus and to sing carols. Nearly 70 people were disappointed as they were unable to get into one of the services and were unable to wait for the next one. I met one particular family who had gone down to the church hall to wait. It was a mother and father with their three children aged 23, 19 and 14. They told me that they had been coming over every year firstly from Hemel and then Tring since the 23-year-old was 10 months old and many other families have similar stories to tell. Our youngest Mary this year was herself a baby Jesus fourteen years ago and it made me think that the babies in those early years must now be well into their forties. Once again, this year, people queued from the church door, through the lych gate, up towards the library. It was wonderful to see so many people in our church. As she passed me at the end of one of the services one person said, "This is where our Christmas really starts". Long may the 'Donkey service' continue to bring joy and the real meaning of Christmas to the hundreds and hundreds of people who queue in the cold to attend.

“Hail, Mary, full of grace,” said Gabriel — or did he? The translation is tricky, but the phrase “full of grace” has lit up the Christian imagination for centuries. Was Gabriel simply being polite, or does it reveal something extraordinary about Mary?

What does it mean to say Mary is full of grace? How was she shaped by God to become the one through whom the Incarnation would come — and when did that shaping begin?

These questions sparked what’s been called “perhaps the most prolonged and passionate debate in Christian theology,” culminating in the dogma of the Immaculate Conception in 1854 — a defining difference between Roman Catholicism and the Reformation.

From the Vicar

How on earth is it Lent already? Well, it isn't quite yet – but come February 18th, round Ash Wednesday comes again and we begin the forty days of serious spiritual discipline journeying towards Good Friday and Easter.

Well, it wouldn't be Lent without a reminder about stewardship – the need to take an annual look at what we're giving, financially speaking, to the Church and the other causes close to God's heart. We need to review this every year, not least because if we don't, the value of our giving drops without our even noticing. If you gave £10 a week in Lent 2025, inflation means that's now worth £9.70. So, quite likely, you need to bump it up a bit – unless, of course, your own circumstances have changed and it needs to come down. Either way, Lent is the time to prayerfully reflect and make the change.

We did, however, focus a great deal on financial stewardship last year. And many people said, quite rightly, that it was equally important to think about all the other ways people give to the Church and to God's Kingdom, through volunteering and the free gift of their time and their talents. So that's what we're doing this year.

And the first thing to say is a massive thank you. This parish runs on the efforts of easily more than a hundred people, serving God and their neighbours in all sorts of ways: arranging flowers, serving meals at the Sunday lunch-club, working in the



churchyard, making sure the church is governed right, playing with toddlers ... the list goes on and on. It is simply wonderful to see how many people want to be involved and all that they do – and it puts all our preoccupations with money into context. A church that had wonderful finances but *didn't* have all these people giving of themselves would be a very poor church indeed. So – hurrah for our people, and for all that they do: in church, and beyond.

Over the course of Lent, there'll be a chance for everyone in the church to think about what they love doing, what they're good at, and what they might be willing to give a go! To get you thinking though, here are just some of the people we *need*....

Thinking first of our *worship*... it would be brilliant to have more people willing to read the lessons, or lead the prayers, or sing in the choir. It has been great to have new members of the serving team recently, carrying the cross and the candles – it would be even greater to turn out a full team every week. If you don't fancy being up front, how about being at the door to be a smiling face welcoming people in? Or, if exercise is what you need, there's no shortage of

chairs and tables to move around before and after Spark or Breathing Space services.

What about pastoral care? All that rather intimidating phrase means, by the way, is looking out for people and helping them. It might be offering someone a lift to and from church – we have several people who would love to come, but can't make it under their own steam. All those food bank donations we take in also need transporting, down to the distribution hub. Our Sunday lunch club is always looking for helpers, and so is our pastoral visiting team – if you're good at drinking tea and chatting with people, this is the one for you. We also have a constantly growing number of people who need to receive communion in their homes, which is a lovely thing to be involved in (certainly of the things I do, selfishly speaking it's among the most spiritually rewarding).

What about *children and young people*? There are some pretty terrifying statistics out there: according to some surveys, one third of Church of England parishes have zero – ZERO – children attending their services regularly. Another third has less than five. Relatively speaking, we are in a fantastic position – but we all know it is fragile. Children will come if they and their families feel welcome: if there are lovely people and fun things waiting for them. Could you help this happen? You don't have to be a wonderfully gifted teacher. It might be simply a matter of being another adult presence in the room for safeguarding purposes. Or, when we get our expanded children's area in the next few weeks, someone will have to make sure it's tidy and has

got enough felt-tips and paper and so on... that could be you, even if children TERRIFY you! Or could you cook? Messy Church would bite your hand off for help in the kitchen once per month.

I've just come from taking the January Taize service. It was really beautiful, and more than one person commented as they left how they were sure people would love it if they came ... if they knew about it. How will they know, if they are not told? Well – are you good at communicating? Could you write something every month for *My Abbots* about things going on in church, or are you creative when it comes to posters or the use of social media? Is there something about the website that maddens you, or do you think our noticeboards could do with a real refresh?

Have I missed the obvious thing? Do you have a sense of what this church needs? Do you have things you'd love us to do, or you can't believe we've missed? Well, maybe we need you as part of our leadership – to come on our committees, to serve on the PCC, even (gulp) in time to become a warden. It's all of our church. It's only going to flourish when we all get stuck in.

Let me know what you'd like to do!

The Snowdrop

The first snow drops were seen in early January starting to flower in the churchyard but soon the churchyard will be covered in a carpet of white.

We are very fortunate to have such a wonderful churchyard that brings joy to so many especially at the end of winter and going into the spring. The flowering of the snowdrops is surely wonderful reminder of the beauty of God's creation. The snow drop originated in Europe and was first recorded in England in the 16th Century. They were grown in churchyards for Candlemass Day which is 2nd February. They were also grown in Abbey gardens as a medicinal plant for the treatment of 'Mal au Tete' which means problems of the head. Here are some interesting facts about snowdrops:

1. Snowdrop's scientific name is *Gallanthus*. This means 'milk flower.' The common snowdrop we normally see with one flower per stem is a *Gallanthus nivalis* which translates as 'milk flower of the snow.'

2. Snowdrops were named after earrings not drops of snow. In the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries women often wore dangle, white drop-shaped earrings known as 'eardrops.' Some other common names of snowdrops are: Fair Maids of February, Candlemas Bells, White Ladies, Little Sister of the Snows, Snow Piercers, Dingle-dangle, Flower of Hope and Death's Flower.

3. Snowdrop's contain a natural anti-freeze. Even if they collapse in freezing

weather they recover once the temperature rises. When temperatures reach 10C (50F) and above, the outer petals open up revealing the nectar inside. When the temperature drops the petal shield closes and protects the nectar. Nature is rather magical as this is perfect for bumble bees which come out of hibernation when the temperature rises above 10C!

4. Snowdrops and their bulbs are poisonous to humans. Some people have mistaken their bulbs for onions or shallots but they would have to eat an awfully lot of them to be fatal.

Snowdrop pollen and nectar is an early spring feast for many bees. The green stripes inside the snowdrops are like landing lights guiding them to one of the only restaurants open this early in the season.

5. Snowdrops are used in medicine to help people. Galamantine extracted from snowdrops is now used in a treatment to slow down dementia in Alzheimer's disease. In folk medicine, snowdrops have been used as remedial herb to ease pain, migraines and headaches.



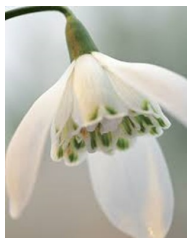

6. Although there are gardens and woodlands where we can see thousands and thousands of snowdrops, they are endangered and even under threat of extinction in some countries where they naturally grow in the wild. This is because too many were dug up to sell to gardeners across the world. Since 1995 international trade has been banned unless you have a special license.

7. There are lots of legends and myths about snowdrops. One of them was the belief that you should never bring in a single or first snowdrop into the home as it was unlucky or even meant there would be a death soon. That's why it's known sometimes as the 'death-flower' and the flower is described as a 'corpse in a shroud. It's also been known as the symbol of hope.

8. Galanthomania! People who are crazy about snowdrops and/or collect them are known as 'Galanthophiles. Special new 'mutant' varieties are sold for huge sums of money. One bulb called *Gallanthus plicatus* 'Golden Fleece' was sold for £1,390 pounds sterling. Some of these collectable bulbs are so precious they are kept locked up or watched over by security guards. A new record was set in February 2022, according to **Garden Illustrated**, when *Galanthus plicatus* 'Golden Tears' was sold on eBay for £1,850 plus £5 postage.

The Eucharist: What's it all about?



Sessions on Thursdays throughout Lent
